Lafayette County Board of Supervisors Minutes Tuesday, April 21, 2020 • 7:00 p.m. Ames Road Multi-Purpose Building

After the Swearing-In Ceremony by Judge Duane Jorgenson at approximately 6:45 p.m., the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors' meeting was brought to order at 7:00 p.m., on Tuesday, April 21, 2020 by County Board Chairman, Mr. Jack Sauer. To allow for proper social distancing, the board meeting was held at the Ames Road Multi-Purpose Building with everyone being temped and offered gloves and masks. Chairman Sauer asked for a moment of silence for former County Board Supervisor from many years ago, Mr. Larry Cherrey, who passed away April 12th. A prayer was led by Mr. Bob Boyle. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Chairman Sauer. There were Fifteen (15) members present with 1 member excused. Chairman Sauer declared a quorum. Present were: Larry Ludlum - District 1; Mike Klein - District 2; Jack Sauer - District 3; John E. Reichling - District 4; Andy Schilling - District 5; Eric J. Stauffacher - District 6; Bob Boyle -District 7; Kriss Marion - District 8; Robert Laeser - District 9; Nancy L. Fisker - District 10; Donna Flannery - District 11; Carmen McDonald -District 12; Lee A. Gill - District 13; Scott E. Pedley - District 15; and Rita Buchholz - District 16. Carol Korn, District 14, had an excused absence.

Chairman Sauer asked the County Clerk, Carla Jacobson, if the ing notice was properly posted. Ms. Jacobson said the meetmeeting notice was properly posted. Ms. Jacobson said the meeting notice was posted at all of the County Buildings (Lafayette County Courthouse, Memorial Hospital, Lafayette Manor, Highway Department, Land Conservation, Human Services, Health Department) the City of Darlington Municipal Building, the Lafayette County Website and sent to

the press.

Chairman Sauer asked the board for approval of the agenda as presented. Motion by Ludlum, second by Marion, to approve the agenda as

presented. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Chairman Sauer asked the board's wishes regarding the minutes from the March 17, 2020 Lafayette County Board of Supervisors' meeting. Motion by Boyle, second by Schilling, for approval of the minutes with the amendment that the minutes reflect (in the first paragraph) that Carol Korn was excused. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Comments and Correspondence: Chairman Sauer said that since the onset of COVID-19, there have not been many committee meetings and that call-in conference meetings are being allowed during this time. Chairman Sauer welcomed the new County Board members (Mike Klein, John Reichling, Eric Stauffacher, Nancy Fisker, Donna Flannery, Carmen McDonald and Lee Gill) and that he was looking forwarded to working with everyone.

Chairman Sauer continued on with the election of County Board officers beginning with the election of County Board Chair. Motion by Laeser, second by Buchholz, to nominate Bob Boyle as County Board Chair. Chairman Sauer asked for any other nominations from the floor. Motion by Schilling, second by Ludlum, to nominate Jack Sauer. Chairman Sauer, three times, asked for any other nominations. Hearing none, motion by Gill, second by Stauffacher to close nominations and cast the vote. Voice vote. Motion carried. County Clerk Carla Jacobson and Chief Deputy Clerk Laurie Monson collected and counted the ballots. County Clerk Carla Jacobson, said the result was Jack Sauer 8 votes and Bob Boyle 7 votes. Mr. Sauer was declared the Lafayette County Board Chairman for the April, 2020 through April, 2022 term. Mr. Sauer thanked the board.

Chairman Sauer continued on with the election of First Vice-Chair. The First Vice-Chair is also the Chair of the Finance Committee. Motion by Laeser, second by Gill, to nominate Scott Pedley as First Vice-Chair. Chairman Sauer, three times, asked for any other nominations. Hearing none, motion by Boyle, second by Laeser, to close nominations and cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Pedley as First Vice-Chair. Voice vote. Motion carried. Mr. Pedley was by unanimous vote declared as the First Vice-Chair for the April, 2020 through April, 2022 term. Mr. Pedley thanked the

Motion by Pedley, second by Reichling, to nominate Larry Ludlum, as Second Vice-Chair. Motion by Laeser, second by Fisker to nominate Kriss Marion, as Second Vice-Chair. Chairman Sauer (three times) asked for any other nominations. Hearing none, motion by Gill, second by Stauffacher to close nominations and cast the vote. Voice County Clerk Carla Jacobson and Chief Deputy vote. Motion carried. Clerk Laurie Monson collected and counted the ballots. County Clerk Carla Jacobson, said the result was Kriss Marion 8 votes and Larry Ludlum 7 votes. Chairman Sauer declared Ms. Marion as the Second Vice-Chair for the April, 2020 through April, 2022 term. Ms. Marion thanked the board.

Chairman Sauer continued on with the election of the Highway Committee. The names of the candidates who want to be considered for the Highway Committee are Bob Boyle, Andy Schilling, Carmen McDonald, John Reichling, Lee Gill and Robert Laeser. Chairman Sauer reminded the board that every County Board member was to either indicate their district number on the ballot and/or to sign their name on the ballot. Also, each ballot calls for the voting of "not more than four" Highway Committee members. Ms. Jacobson and Ms. Monson, collected and counted the ballots. County Clerk Carla Jacobson, said the result was Lee Gill - 13; Bob Boyle – 11; Andy Schilling – 10 and Carmen McDonald – 9. John Reichling and Robert Laeser each received 8 votes. Mr. Sauer congratulated Lee Gill, Bob Boyle, Andy Schilling and Carmen McDonald as the members of

COVID-19 Emergency Sick Leave Policy Specific to Lafayette County Employees WHEREAS, in December, 2019, a novel strain of the coronavirus was

detected, now named COVID-19, and it has spread throughout the world, including every state in the United States; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, Governor Tony Evers declared a public health emergency to direct all resources needed to respond to and

contain COVID-19 in Wisconsin; and
WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Donald Trump proclaimed

a National Emergency concerning COVID-19; and
WHEREAS, on March 18, 2020, President Donald Trump signed legislation in response to the COVID-19 pandemic titled the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (herein referred to as FFCRA) which modifies the requirements for the Family and Medical Leave Act (Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act), and creates paid sick leave Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act), and creates paid sick leave (Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act) for employees while the employee or nis/her family members are impacted by COVID-19. The Act will take effect on April 1, 2020, with a sunset date of December 31, 2020; and WHEREAS, the FFCRA excludes "Emergency Responders" and "Health Care Providers;" and WHEREAS, the Department of Labor provided guidance and stated on March 28, 2020 that for the purposes of the FFCRA "health care providers" shall include anyone employed at any doctor's office, hospital, health care center clinic, post-secondary educational institution offering heath

care center, clinic, post-secondary educational institution offering heath care instruction, medical school, local health department or agency, nursing facility, retirement facility, nursing home, home health care provider, any facility that performs laboratory or medical testing, pharmacy, or any similar institution, employer, or entity. This includes any permanent or temporary institution, facility, location, or site where medical services are provided that are similar to such institutions; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Labor provided guidance and stated on March 28, 2020 that for the purposes of the FFCRA "emergency responders" is an employee who is necessary for the provision of transport, care, health care, comfort, and nutrition of such patients, or whose services are otherwise needed to limit the spread of COVID-19. This includes but is not limited to military or national guard, law enforcement officers, correctional institution personnel, fire fighters, emergency medical services personnel, physicians, nurses, public health personnel, emergency medical technicians, paramedics, emergency management personnel, 911 operators, public works personnel, and person with skills or training in operating specialized equipment or other skills needed to provide aid in a declared emergency as well as individuals who work for such facilities employing these individuals and whose work is necessary to maintain the operation of the facility. This also includes any individual that the highest official of a state or territory, including the District of Columbia, determines is an emergency responder necessary for that state's or territory's or the District of Columbia's response to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, after applying the above analysis, it has been determined that Lafayette County, as a local government, can define "emergency responder" and "health care provider" with clarification from the Department of Labor and exclude them from the FFCRA; and

WHEREAS, Lafayette County hereby defines all positions in Lafayette County designated as either "emergency responder" or "health care provider" for purposes of the application and implementation of the FFCRA. Under the Authority of Resolution 65-19 Providing County Administration Emergency Administrative Flexibility for COVID-19, I hereby approve the exemption of FFCRA as defined above; and

WHEREAS, Lafayette County recognizes its employees and the exposure they are subjected to due to directly combating COVID-19 as

essential employees of the county; and

WHEREAS, Lafayette County has created a separate COVID-19 Emergency Sick Leave Policy specifically eligible for all employees active-

ly employed by Lafayette County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all employees actively employed by Lafayette County as eligible Lafayette County employees considered full-time, will be eligible for 80 hours; regular part time employees will be eligible for a pro-rated amount based upon their regular hours of work of COVID-19 Emergency Paid Sick Leave if one of the following criteria are met:

- 1. Employee is subject to a Federal, State or Local guarantine or isolation order related to COVID-19; OR
 - 2. Employee has been advised by a health care provider to self-

quarantine due to concerns related to COVID-19: OR

3. Employee is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and seeking a

medical diagnosis

This policy will remain in effect from April 1, 2020 until December 31, 1118 policy will remain in effect from April 1, 2020 until December 31, 2020. It will not be carried over to the New Year, and upon separation from employment, any unused Emergency Paid Sick Leave is forfeited. Under the authority of Resolution 65-19 Providing County Administration Emergency Administrative Flexibility for COVID-19, I hereby approve of the creation of the COVID-19 Emergency Sick Leave, specifically designed for Lafavette County employees and has no affiliation with the Emergency. for Lafayette County employees and has no affiliation with the Emergency Paid Sick Leave (EPSLA) as signed into legislature by President Donald

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, Governor Tony Evers declared a public health emergency to direct all resources needed to respond to and

contain COVID-19 in Wisconsin; and
WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Donald Trump proclaimed

a National Emergency concerning COVID-19; and
WHEREAS, on March 18, 2020, the Families First Coronavirus
Response Act (herein referred to as FFCRA) was passed which modifies the requirements for the Family and Medical Leave Act (Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act), and creates paid sick leave (Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act) for employees while the employee or his/ her family members are impacted by COVID-19. Baker Tilly COVID-19 Advisory Services: CPA Carla Gogin of Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP, via zoom, gave the board a presentation with respect to providing the County with COVID-19 advisory services. The objective is to help Lafayette County prepare for and prosper during the objective is to help Larayette County prepare for and prosper during the new normal related to crisis recovery assistance at an estimated fee of \$15,000 for overall advisory services up to 60 hours. Baker Tilly would make sure Lafayette County is applying for all available funding sources and ensure the county has the proper policies in place to accept funding/capturing eligible costs that will affect our future financial decisions and overall financial position. Motion by Boyle, second by Reichling, to approve Baker Tilly for COVID-19 Advisory Services at a cost of \$15,000 not to exceed 60 hours. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Baker Tilly Capital Improvement Plan: Ms. Gogin then gave a presentation to the board, via zoom, on the development of a Capital Improvement Policy and Plan. The purpose of this project is to assist Lafayette County in the development of a capital improvement plan that will identify the needed capital improvements, funding sources, and local property tax impacts over the planning period. In addition, the process will include the development of a capital improvement policy to guide the planning and decision-making process, for a lump-sum fee of \$19,825. Motion by Pedley, second by Ludlum, to approve Baker Tilly to assist Lafayette County with a Capital Improvement Plan at a lump-sum fee of \$19,825. Voice vote Motion carried \$19,825. Voice vote. Proposal for Compensation Structure Analysis Services for Lafayette County by Carlson Dettmann Consulting. Patrick Glynn, Senior Consultant of Carlson Dettmann Consulting, LLC, via zoom, presented to the board, a Proposal for Compensation Structure Analysis Services. This study would cover approximately 125 job classifications. Due to financial limitations, the County's intent is to review its internal hierarchy and appropriately place positions on its existing wage structure. The County is not seeking a market analysis at this time. This project will establish a solid foundation future market analysis and salary structure redesign. The total professional fee for the classification study would be \$36,000, plus reasonable travel expenses. After much

discussion, motion by Pedley, second by McDonald, to proceed with Carlson Dettmann Consulting at a cost of \$36,000 plus reasonable travel expenses. Voice vote. Motion carried.

WHEREAS, it is our belief that, the 1976 U.S Supreme Court ruling Buckley v. Valeo changed the course of American elections by establishing the doctrine that spending money to influence elections is a form of speech; and

Federal Elections Commission, the Court diverged from precedent by ruling that corporate spending on elections, pursuant to *Buckley v. Comments and Correspondence:

Chairman Sauer read correspondence received from the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families, addressed to Laurie Neis, Director of the Lafayette County Child Support Agency, congratulating the agency for receiving the Federal Fiscal Year 2019 Certificate of Excellence Award. Reports: None

Jerry Huffman, Regional US Census Bureau Partnership Specialist, gave a presentation to the board on the importance of the 2020 Census. Federal funding is largely dictated by population and the higher the count

the more funding a community can receive.

Ward Marshall from Pattern Energy gave the board a slide show pre-sentation on a proposed wind farm project. Pattern Energy is developing plans for the installation of 120 to 200 turbines across more than 30,000 acres in Lafayette and lowa counties. The project is contingent upon the construction of the Cardinal-Hickory Creek transmission line, which would connect the 600-megawatt farm to the electric grid. Construction of the wind farm would begin no sooner than 2023. Pattern Energy has negotiated some lease agreements with landowners. Meteorological towers that collect wind data will be installed in the Fall. The wind farm would span multiple townships that might mostly include Belmont Township in Lafayette County.

A presentation was given by representatives of WI RNG HUB SOUTH, LLC (the "Borrower") outlining a project consisting of the design, engineering and construction of a renewable energy project on several local dairy farms. Methane gas created by operation of manure digesters will be captured, scrubbed, and injected in the natural gas pipeline ultimately providing natural gas to purchasers in California. In some cases, the methane will be transported to be scrubbed. This "hub and spoke" project will enable local dairy farms to resolve issues of manure handling, run off and related issues and will provide a direct source of revenue to the participating dairies. The Borrower is still in discussions with a number of dairies regarding participation in the Project. The Borrower explained the technology and answered questions posed by Board members. The Borrower is requesting that the County serve as a conduit issuer for taxexempt and taxable bonds. Structuring the financing as a bond will lower the interest rate on the financing at no cost to the County. The amount of the proposed financing is an amount not to exceed \$55 million.

Lynda Templen, a partner with Husch Blackwell LLP, Milwaukee Wisconsin is serving as Bond Counsel for the financing. Lynda provided an explanation of how tax-exempt financing works and explained that the County will have no liability for payment of the Bonds but serves only as a conduit whereby the interest on the Bonds will be tax-exempt to the owners of the Bonds, resulting in the lower interest rate. She explained that the borrowing does not impact or otherwise limit the ability of the County to borrow for its own needs, does not affect the credit of the County. The County will provide no guaranty of the Bonds and will not levy any tax for the payment of the Bonds. Lynda also provided the Board with a written summary outlining the financing and a discussion copy of a form of Resolution to be considered by the County at a future date. Lynda answered questions posed by the Board and will be working with legal counsel for the County on future actions and requests.

EXHIBIT A

GENERAL PROVISIONS

(1) AREAS TO BE REGULATED

This ordinance regulates all areas that would be covered by the regional flood or base flood as shown on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) or other maps approved by DNR. Base flood elevations are derived from the flood profiles in the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and are shown as AE, A1-30, and AH Zones on the FIRM. Other regulatory zones are displayed as A and AO zones. Regional Flood Elevations (RFE) may be derived from other studies. If more than one map or revision is referenced, the most restrictive information shall apply.

(2.) OFFICIAL MAPS & REVISIONS

The boundaries of all floodplain districts are designated as A, AE AH, AO or A1-30 on the maps based on the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) listed below. Any change to the base flood elevations (BFE) or any changes to the boundaries of the floodplain or floodway in the FIS or on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) must be reviewed and approved by the DNR and FEMA through the Letter of Map Change process (see s. 8.0 Amendments) before it is effective. No changes to RFE's on non-FEMA maps shall be effective until approved by the DNR. These maps and revisions are on file in the office of Lafayette County Conservation & Zoning. If more than one map or revision is referenced, the most restrictive information shall apply.

(a) OFFICIAL MAPS: Based on the FIS

PROPÉRTY TAX LIMITATION & 2021 LEVY

Per WI State Statute 66.0602, Wisconsin counties are subject to a tax levy limit. This limit restricts a county's levy increase to the greater of 0% or the county's net new construction growth in equalized value otherwise known as "new growth." The County's net new construction growth for known as "new growth." The County's net new construction growth for the 2021 budget was .913%, which is a decrease from the 2020 amount of 1.162%. The proposed budget sets the operating levy at the legal maximum for Lafayette County in 2021 which is \$7,164,107. The levy was reduced by Personal Property Aid of \$45,461.66, which will be offset by a payment from the State of Wisconsin in May of 2021. After adjustments, debt service, library aid, special charges, tax chargebacks, and county bridge aid, the total proposed 2021 levy is \$8,676,203.50.

EQUALIZED VALUATION & MILL RATE

Lafayette County's equalized valuation increased 3.66% to \$1,216,043,400, not including tax incremental districts (TIDs). Combined with a levy of \$8,676,203.50, this produces an overall mill rate of \$7.1348 per \$1,000, which is a decrease of 1.445% over the 2020 Mill Rate.

DEBT SERVICE LEVY

DEBT SERVICE LEVY The debt service levy reflects the County Board's decision to fund certain capital projects through the extension of promissory notes. The 2021 budget includes \$855,000 of anticipated new debt to fund 2021 purchases by the IT, Property/Maintenance, Highway, Human Resources, and Sheriff's Departments. The 2021 debt service levy is \$1,206,440, resulting in a debt service tax levy rate of

\$.9921 per \$1,000. The repayment of new 2021 debt levy items will be included in the 2022 debt service levy budget.

WAGES & FRINGES

After many meetings and consideration, the County was unable to include a county-wide increase in the 2021 budget. When faced with a large healthcare cost increase, it was decided to reduce the employer contribution down to 84%, from 88%, to keep the cost impact as low as possible for employees while trying to balance the overall County budget.

Funding for PSAP GRANTS

WHEREAS, modernizing Wisconsin's 911 system has been a priority for local governments, Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs), law enforcement, and the telecommunications industry since the early 2000s;

WHEREAS, the 2017-19 and the 2019-21 state biennial budgets provided funding for creation of a statewide emergency services IP network (ESInet), which is the first step in the transition to a digital Next Generation 911 (NG911) system; and

WHEREAS, a NG911 system utilizes advancements in technology to improve communication with 911 operators and provides greater efficiency in assisting individuals in crisis; and

WHEREAS, local 911 centers (PSAPs) require NG911 capable equip-

ment to connect to the digital system; and WHEREAS, currently many PSAPs require an upgrade of their equipment to NG911 or will require maintenance and security upgrades to their current NG911 capable equipment; and

WHEREAS, the average cost for the necessary equipment upgrades will likely exceed \$250,000 per county in addition to ongoing maintenance costs based on the number of call stations in the PSAP; and

WHEREAS, while the state has provided grant funding for counties in the past to upgrade local PSAPs, state funding has not existed in over a decade; and

WHEREAS, Section 66.1103 of the Wisconsin Statutes (the "Act")
authorizes Lafayette County, Wisconsin (the "Issuer" or the "County"), to
authorize the issuance and sale of bonds by the Issuer to construct equin

authorize the issuance and sale of bonds by the Issuer to construct, equip, re-equip, acquire by gift, lease or purchase, install, reconstruct, rebuild, rehabilitate, improve, supplement, replace, maintain, repair, enlarge, extend or remodel industrial projects; and

WHEREAS, Section 66.1103(3)(f) of the Act provides that a municipality or county also may finance an industrial project which is located entirely outside the geographic limits of the municipality or county, but only if the revenue agreement for the project also relates to another project of the same eligible participant, part of which is located within the geographic

limits of the municipality or county; and
WHEREAS, WI RNG Hub South LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, and/or a related entity, and/or a limited liability entity to be formed (collectively, the "Borrower"), desires to complete a multi-site project to be located on properties owned or leased by various dairy operations including, but not limited to Darlington Ridge Farms located at 24425 St. including, but not limited to Darlington Ridge Farms located at 24425 St. Peters Road, Darlington, Wisconsin and 8487 Rural Ridge Road, Cuba City, Wisconsin; Cotton Wood Dairy LLC located at 9600 County Road D, South Wayne, Wisconsin; Red Rock View Farms located at 10548 Palmer Road, Darlington, Wisconsin; Schilling Farms LLC located at 17611 Furnace Hill Road, Darlington, Wisconsin and Highway Dairy LLC located at 16639 Highway 23, Darlington, Wisconsin; Bollant Farms located at 1345 Ebenezer Road, Fennimore, Wisconsin; Clark View Farms located at 12128 Ready Hollow Road, Bagley, Wisconsin; Stone-Front Farm located at 5027 Highway 81, Lancaster, Wisconsin; and Kieler Farms located at 5305 Stanton Road, Platteville, Wisconsin (collectively, the "Project Sites") to finance the (i) design, development, construction and operation of one to finance the (i) design, development, construction and operation of one or more anaerobic digesters, (ii) acquisition and installation of related equipment, (iii) construction of a pipeline from one or more of the Project Sites, (iv) installation of a CO2 scrubber to process the collected digester gas from the Project Sites, (v) capitalized interest during the construction period, (vi) funding of a Debt Service Reserve Fund, and (vii) payment of certain professional fees and costs of issuance (collectively, the "Project"), all of which would contribute to the well-being of Lafayette County, Grant County, and Richland County, Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the cost of the Project is presently estimated not to exceed \$60,000,000 and the amount proposed to be financed with one or more issues or series of tax-exempt and/or taxable solid waste disposal revenue bonds (the "Bonds") issued under the Act does not exceed \$60,000,000;

WHEREAS, the Borrower has requested that the Issuer now approve an initial resolution (the "Initial Resolution") providing for the financing of the Project in an amount not to exceed \$60,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the Issuer is a political subdivision organized and existing under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Wisconsin, and is authorized to enter into revenue agreements with eligible participants with respect to the Project whereby eligible participants agree to cause said Project to be constructed and to pay the Issuer an amount of funds sufficient to provide for the prompt payment when due of the principal and interest on said solid waste disposal revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, farming is the largest single industry in Lafayette County, Grant County, and Richland County; and as such is fundamental to the success of all residents of the counties; and

WHERAS, the Project will provide direct and indirect benefits to resiwhich As, the Project will provide direct and indirect benefits to residents of Lafayette County, Grant County, and Richland County, including but not limited to (i) increased revenue to farms using the Project, (ii) reduced operational costs resulting from use of digesters, (iii) reduced trucking and hauling costs, (iv) improved control of run off and other environmental concerns, (v) ancillary benefit from the improved farm conomy to the other husinesses and residents of Lafayette County Great County. to the other businesses and residents of Lafayette County, Grant County, Richland County, and locations in the neighboring counties; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, individual counties or two or more counties or municipalities acting together may also serve as the conduit

issuer for such financing; and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest and in furtherance of essential public purposes of the County to promote, attract, stimulate, rehabilitate and revitalize commerce, farming, industry and manufacturing, to promote the betterment of the economy of the County; and NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of Lafayette County, Wisconsin, as follows:

1. Based upon representations of the Borrower, it is the finding and determination of the County Board that the Project is a qualified "project" within the meaning of the Act and that the Borrower is an "eligible participant" within the meaning of the Act. The County Board agrees that the County shall:

- Serve as the conduit Issuer, pursuant to an Intergovernmental Agreement (the "Intergovernmental Agreement") by and among the County and other participating municipalities (the "Participating Municipalities"), any, to finance the Project in an amount not to exceed \$60,000,000; and
- (b) Issue solid waste disposal revenue bonds in one or more series of tax-exempt and/or taxable bonds (the "Bond(s)"), in an amount not to exceed \$60,000,000 in order to finance costs of the Project, located in the Counties pursuant to Section 66.1103(3)(f) of the Act.

The aforesaid plan of financing contemplates, and is conditioned

upon, the following:

(a) The Bonds shall be limited obligations of the Issuer, acting pursuant to an Intergovernmental Agreement by and among the Issuer and any other Participating Municipalities, if any, and are payable solely from revenues provided by the Borrower, and shall never constitute an indebtedness of the Issuer or the Participating Municipalities within the meaning of any state constitutional provision or statutory limitation;

(b) The Bonds shall not constitute or give rise to a pecuniary liability of the Issuer or the Participating Municipalities or a charge against the Issuer's or the Participating Municipalities' general credit or taxing powers;

- The Project shall be subject to property taxation in the same amount and to the same extent as though the Project were not financed with solid waste disposal revenue bonds;

(d) The Borrower shall find a purchaser for all of the Bonds;
(e) The County's and any Participating Municipalities' out-ofpocket costs, including but not limited to County's fees, Participating
Municipalities' fees, legal fees and Trustee's fees, in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds shall be paid by the Borrower; and

(f) A notice of public hearing required by federal law for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in Lafayette County and the Participating Municipalities, and a public hearing shall be held to provide interested individuals or parties the opportunity to testify as to the Project and the issuance of the Bonds.

3. The aforesaid plan of financing shall not be legally binding upon the

Issuer nor be finally implemented unless and until:

- (a) The details and mechanics of the Intergovernmental Agreement and the financing are authorized and approved by a further resolution of the County Board which shall be solely within the discretion of the County Board;
- The County Clerk shall cause notice of adoption of this Initial Resolution, in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A, to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation in Lafayette County, and the electors of Lafayette County shall have been given the opportunity to petition for a referendum on the matter of the aforesaid Bond issue, all as required by
- (c) Either no such petition shall be timely filed or such petition shall have been filed and said referendum shall have approved the Bond issue;
- (d) The County Clerk shall have received an employment impact estimate issued under Section 238.11 of the Wisconsin Statutes;

(e) All documents required to consummate the financing have been duly authorized and delivered; and

The Issuer, Participating Municipalities and the Borrower have resolved all land use and special use issues with respect to the affected property and the Project.

4. Pursuant to the Act, all requirements that the Project be subject to the contracting requirements contained in Section 66.1103 are waived, the Borrower having represented that it is able to negotiate satisfactory arrangements for completing the Project and that the Issuer's interests are

- not prejudiced thereby.

 5. The County Clerk is directed, following adoption of this Initial Resolution (i) to publish notice of such adoption not less than one time in the official newspaper of Lafayette County, Wisconsin, such notice to be in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A and (ii) to file a copy of this Initial Resolution, together with a statement indicating the date the Notice to Electors was published, with the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation within twenty (20) days following the date of publication of such notice.
- This Initial Resolution is an "initial resolution" within the meaning of the Act and official action toward issuance of the Bonds for purposes of Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and the regulations promulgated thereunder. Furthermore, it is the reasonable expectation of the Issuer that proceeds of the Bonds may be used to reimburse expenditures made on the Project prior to the issuance of the Bonds. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the Project on the date hereof is not to exceed \$60,000,000. This statement of official intent is made pursuant to Treasury Regulations §1.150-2.

The County's support of the Project for and with the Borrower is in the public interest and in furtherance of the public purposes of the County. Passed and adopted at a regular meeting of the County Board of Supervisors of Lafayette County, Wisconsin this 10th day of November,

WHEREAS, Lafayette County administers the Child Support Enforcement Program on behalf of the state, providing services to Lafayette County residents including paternity establishment, obtaining child support and health insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those orders; and
WHEREAS, our children's well-being, economic security and success

in life are enhanced by parents who provide financial and emotional sup-

port; and

WHEREAS, county child support agencies collected \$935 Million in child support during 2019 and established 98,405 health insurance orders for Wisconsin children; and

WHEREAS, Lafayette County's Child Support Agency provides services to children as well as custodial and non-custodial parents that reduce childhood poverty rates, establish parental rights and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children; and

WHEREAS, the economic security and social service programs provided by the Lafayette County Child Support Agency are needed by Wisconsin children and families now more than ever due to the economic downturn caused by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, State funding for county child support services has failed to keep up with county agency costs, which have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation and new federal regulations; and WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program has

fallen from 2nd in the nation for collecting current support to 5th; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's decreased performance has led to the state losing out on an estimated \$70,000 in potential federal incentive payments

between Calendar Year 2019 and 2020; and

WHEREAS, an abrupt federal interpretation change in June 2019 eliminated \$4.2 million in federal birth cost recovery matching funds for Wisconsin: and

 The current inequitable distribution of funding among ADRCs.
 The need to increase funding so that all ADRCs may effectively meet their mission, as outlined in the Scope of Services contract addendum; and WHEREAS, the Office for Resource Center Development (ORCD) within the Department of Health Services (DHS) established a stakeholder

advisory group in 2017 to discuss ADRC funding; and WHEREAS, the stakeholder advisory group identified a number of issues with the current funding formula, such as:

•Dollars are distributed based on the date of ADRC establishment older ADRCs (Generation One) receive more funding than ADRCs established at a later date (Generation Two and Three ADRCs);

The Lafayette County Ordinances as adopted by the Board of Supervisors on November 14, 2000, is hereby amended and revised a fol-

The Lafayette County Floodplain Zoning Ordinance has been in effect since November 14, 2000

Since that time there have been changes and modifications to the Wisconsin Administrative Code, Chapter NR 116 and upgrading of standards established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), relating to the National Flood Insurance Program.

The incorporation of these changes and standards into our Floodplain Zoning Ordinance is necessary to remain in compliance with Chapter NR 116 and to remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance

Program.

The Lafayette County Planning & Zoning Committee conducted a public hearing on the amendment of Chapter 6-3 Lafayette County Floodplain

Zoning Ordinance on January 12, 2021

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Lafayette County
Board of Supervisors that Chapter 6-3 Lafayette County Floodplain Zoning Ordinance is amended and is attached as Exhibit A.

(1) AREAS TO BE REGULATED

This ordinance regulates all areas that would be covered by the regional flood or base flood as shown on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) or other maps approved by DNR. Base flood elevations are derived from the flood profiles in the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and are shown as AE, A1-30, and AH Zones on the FIRM. Other regulatory zones are displayed as A and AO zones. Regional Flood Elevations (RFE) may be derived from other studies. If more than one map or revision is referenced, the most restrictive information shall apply.

(2) OFFICIAL MAPS & REVISIONS

The boundaries of all floodplain districts are designated as A, AE, AH, AO or A1-30 on the maps based on the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) listed below. Any change to the base flood elevations (BFE) or any changes to the boundaries of the floodplain or floodway in the FIS or on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) must be reviewed and approved by the DNR and FEMA through the Letter of Map Change process (see s. 8.0 Amendments) before it is effective. No changes to RFE's on non-FEMA maps shall be effective until approved by the DNR. These maps and revisions are on file in the office of Lafayette County Conservation & Zoning. If more than one map or revision is referenced, the most restrictive

information shall apply.

Lafayette County Économic Development - EMS Project Manager, Abby Haas, said that the consultant from the Paramedic Foundation, Paul Anderson, has been here and met with 20 to 30 people for three days. Mr. Anderson does think that Lafayette County is the best possible solution and place for the ambulance service. Abby said that Mr. Anderson is very happy with the plan as it is unfolding and thinks it is a good solution for our community. Chairman Sauer also said that Mr. Anderson also approved the job description and wage range of the position. Many people are on their second round for the COVID vaccine. Chairman Sauer said that hopefully by this Summer the County will be somewhat more normal and out of some of this pandemic.

Appointments: None. Reports: None.

Lafayette County Clerk Carla Jacobson and IT Director Bob Ward, successfully obtained and applied for a County Election Security Subgrant, in the amount of \$38,829.20, issued by the Wisconsin Elections Commission which is a subgrant of the 2020 HAVA Election Security Grant, authorized by the U.S. Congress. The purpose of the subgrant is to help address 2020 federal election security needs. Funds may be used to make payments for activities that enhance election technology and make election security improvements, which include personnel, equipment, and training costs associated with cyber vulnerabilities, physical security, voter registration systems and management, election auditing, staff training and communications. Lafayette County hired Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP (Baker Tilly) to assist Lafayette County, in performing a cybersecurity risk assessment. A virtual presentation was given to the board by Brian Nichols, Director -Risk Advisory of Baker Tilly and IT Director of Lafayette County, Bob Ward, regarding Cybersecurity, which included municipality cybersecurity threats; high-level overview of our assessment activities, identified risk areas and recommendations; and discussion on BC/DR planning followed by questions and answers. There are areas for improvements in the County's IT and security program with needed investments to better protect and support the County from cyber threats.

Chairman Sauer called upon Ms. Flannery, member of the Law

Enforcement Committee, to present Resolution 68-20 Declaring Lafayette County a Second Amendment Sanctuary County. After the reading of the resolution, motion by Flannery, second by Reichling, for approval of the resolution as presented. Four people from the public spoke in favor of the resolution. After more discussion and several questions from board members, Mr. Pedley called for the question. Chairman Sauer asked for any more debate. Hearing none, Chairman Sauer asked the Clerk, Carla Jacobson, for a roll call vote. A roll call vote was taken by the Clerk, Carla Jacobson, beginning with Pedley. The result was 9 Yes and 6 No with Buchholz, Klein, Boyle, Marion, Laeser and Fisker voting No. The motion carried to approve Resolution 68-20 with 6 negative votes.

RESOLUTION 68 - 20

Declaring Lafayette County a Second Amendment Sanctuary County
WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States is the Supreme Law
of our nation; and

WHEREAS, Sanctuary County is defined as a county which resolves to resist infringements upon the inalienable, God given rights enumerated in the U.S. Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Right of the People to Keep and Bear Arms is guaranteed as an Individual Right under the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution; reads "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed;" and under the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin, Article 1, Section 25, reads "The people have the right to keep and bear arms for security, defense, hunting, recreation or any other lawful purpose;

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court in District of Columbia v. Heller, 554 U.S. 570 (2008), affirmed an individual's right to possess firearms, unconnected with service in a militia, for traditionally lawful purposes, such as self-defense within the home; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court in McDonald v. Chicago, 561 U.S. 742 (2010), affirmed that the right of an individual to "keep and bear arms," as protected under the Second Amendment, is incorporated by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment against the states; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court in United States v. Miller, 307 U.S. 174 (1939), opined that firearms that are part of ordinary military equipment, or with use that could contribute to the common defense are protected by the Second Amendment; and

WHEREAS, the Right of the People to Keep and Bear Arms for the defense of Life and Liberty is regarded as an Inalienable Right by the People of Lafayette County, Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the People of Lafayette County, Wisconsin derive an economic benefit from all safe forms of firearms recreation, hunting, and shooting conducted within Lafayette County using all types of firearms heretofore allowable under the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin: and

WHEREAS, the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, were elected to represent the People of Lafayette County and being duly sworn by their Oath of Office, to uphold the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, are concerned about the passage of any bill containing language which could be interpreted as infringing the rights of the citizens of Lafayette County to keep and bear arms; and

WHEREAS, the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, wish to express deep commitment to the rights of all citizens of Lafayette County to keep and bear arms; and

WHEREAS, the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, wish to express opposition to any law that would unconstitutionally restrict the rights of the citizens of Lafayette County to keep and bear arms; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin State Assembly and the Wisconsin State Senate, being elected by the People of the State of Wisconsin and being duly sworn by their Oath of Office to uphold the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, any legislation considered by the Wisconsin State Legislature that would infringe upon the Right to Keep and Bear Arms and would ban the possession and/or use of any weapons including firearms, magazines, ammunition or body armor now employed by individual citizens of Lafayette County for their defense of Life and Liberty or for the purposes of hunting, recreation or other lawful purposes or would require a firearms owner I.D. card or tax the possession of firearms or ammunition or require the registration and/or confiscation of said weapons and ammunition within Lafayette County, Wisconsin; would be a violation of the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution and of Article 1, Section 25 of the Wisconsin Constitution

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, at the request of the Law Enforcement Committee, hereby declare the County of Lafayette in the State of Wisconsin to be a

Second Amendment Sanctuary County; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the People of Lafayette County, expressing their will through their elected representatives, affirm their support of the Sheriff to exercise sound discretion to not enforce against any

citizen an unconstitutional firearms law; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, shall not appropriate or authorize any funds, resources, employees, buildings, detention centers or offices for any enforcement of unconstitutional laws that infringe against the People of Lafayette County, Wisconsin; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Lafayette County Board of Supervisors, State of Wisconsin, do hereby oppose the enactment of any legislation that would infringe upon the Right of the People to keep and bear arms and consider such laws to be unconstitutional and beyond lawful legislative authority and to be an act of tyranny.
